**A letter to Thomas**

Dear Thomas

What a time you went through. Jesus' brutal death was shattering for you all. And, on top of everything else, the fear you shared as a group must have been immense. Then when the others excitedly told you Jesus was alive and had come into the room when you were out must have been hard to take. Your reaction says it all.

Did you need to get some space? Was that why you were out? Did you need to be alone, trying to clear your head, grieving without the added heartache of the others, taking time to re-live memories of Jesus, complaining to God about why it all had to end like this?

Did you ask 'what if...'? What if Jesus hadn't been so confrontational with the Authorities, what if he'd been more careful? He was such a wonderful teacher about God's love for us. He was still a young man, he could have had years to continue teaching and caring for the sick and the poor. What questions were going through your mind? You were someone who asked questions. You were a good listener. You wanted to know more.

The feeling of being left out must have hurt, especially if the others kept talking about it and who wouldn't. What did it do to your faith? You felt God's absence when the others felt he was still around. How hard was all that?

What was going on in your head? You were isolated. How did you handle that? What was your prayer like in the loneliness that was particularly yours? We all want a God we can see and feel, you had neither. Maybe you can help us in our isolation now?

It was more than a week before Jesus appeared to you all again. He came back for you—on your terms: he understood you. He knew how to answer your questions and took on board your demands. You asked for proof and he gave it, asking you to believe beyond your doubt.

Your reaction to Jesus at this second visit was stunning. Brilliant. The conversations following must have been worth hearing.

Faith is helped by our senses. Reassure us now when we can't see Jesus and receive him in the Eucharist. I imagine you want to tell us that we're connected to the Lord nonetheless. He's always here. You're a powerful example to us. Help us to be good listeners, to be attentive to God's words, to know we are understood and loved and that we still have more to learn.
